Summary:

Children are happy, confident, and engaged in their activities. They really enjoy the play opportunities available to them. They build good relationships with the staff knowing their decisions and choices will be respected. Children learn to socialise kindly with their friends and have opportunities to develop their independence.

Staff follow policies and procedures to ensure children's health and safety are prioritised. They manage interactions with children positively and are good role models. They know the children well, listen to them and plan play and learning opportunities that will promote children's all-round development.

The environment is well organised and well-equipped both inside and outside to meet the needs of children. There are a good range of toys and resources for the ages and stages of children cared for. Leaders monitor the environment well to keep it safe, clean, well-organised and stimulating for

children. They identify and plan developments and improvements to the service which they then successfully complete.

Leaders have good oversight of the service and are very motivated and committed to making improvements and maintaining good standards within the setting. They review their policies and procedures and maintain the appropriate records effectively. Partnerships with parents and outside agencies are positive.

Findings:



Well-being

Good

Children have a good voice and make choices confidently, communicating well with staff and each other. They know their opinions and interests are acted upon and respected by the staff that care for them. For example, one child was imagining caring for a baby and the staff member asked if she wanted to have a doll which she did, and staff promptly got her a range of dolls to choose from.

Children are happy, and quickly settle to play, separating easily and confidently from their care givers/parents. They develop a clear sense of belonging and quickly become familiar with daily routines. For example, washing hands before snack and lunch. Children move happily and confidently around the environment helping themselves to favourite toys and resources that interest them. Children feel valued seeing their work on display.

Children interact well with staff and ask them for support in their play, go to them if they need reassurance or to celebrate their achievements. For example, one child diligently and with great patience tried to make bubbles. After repeatedly trying, a member of staff asked if they wanted support and more washing up liquid. Interactions between children are positive and they form constructive relationships as they learn to share and socialise with their friends. They enjoy sociable mealtimes, chatting happily with their friends and staff. They wait patiently to wash their hands and share resources when playing.

Children thoroughly enjoy their play and learning opportunities. They have great fun as they play together with a range of activities. Children have opportunities to play indoors or outside. However, there is a safety gate that hinders free flow between the two areas and the toilet. Children who prefer to play on their own, present as comfortable and happy in their play choices, building tracks for their tractors.

Children have opportunities to develop their independence. Older children access the toilet facilities freely and wash their hands independently. They help to tidy up after play. They confidently move around the learning areas, accessing resources to support their interests. Some self-serving is promoted at snack times. All children confidently feed themselves and sit sociably at the table for snacks and lunch. Coat pegs are easily accessible to encourage children to organise their belongings and use them independently.



Care & Development

Good

Staff are appropriately qualified and understand their roles and responsibility to keep children safe. They have a good understanding of the nature of potential safeguarding concerns, understand the safeguarding policy and their duty to report concerns to the safeguarding officer or outside agencies. They are professional and implement the nursery procedures to a good standard. Staff keep written records of accidents and incidents involving children, and parents are informed. They record the administration of medication and ensure parents sign to acknowledge the information. They ensure the staff implement good hygiene procedures to help keep children healthy and safe. Allergy procedures are clear and implemented by staff. Staff promote healthy eating habits and provide healthy varied meals and snacks. Children bring their own water bottles and water is always available so that they remain hydrated. Staff ensure all children spend time outside each day and we saw children play happily outdoors. Staff encourage children to exercise and explore their environment by engaging in lots of outdoor activities that promote their physical development.

Staff build warm and nurturing relationships with the children. They understand the behaviour management policy and consistently use positive reinforcement. They praise and encourage children for good tidying and accomplishing their goals during play. Staff sit with children to eat lunch and act as good role models; they encourage good manners and remind children to say 'please' and 'thank you'. They create positive relationships with children in their care and celebrate their achievements.

Staff ensure children have lots of opportunities to direct their own learning as well as some adult led activities. Staff undertake observations of children's progress and loosely plan with children's interests in mind, activities that will engage children and encourage their curiosity. Staff know children and their individual needs well. They naturally adjust the care and the behaviour strategies they use to suit individuals. Children with additional needs are well supported and staff work effectively with outside agencies to ensure good outcomes for children.



Environment

Good

Leaders have procedures in place to ensure the environment is safe and secure. Staff record visitors and check their identity before allowing entry into the building. Staff sign in and out of the building and registers of staff and children are kept, demonstrating who is caring for children and who is present in the building. Staff manage the environment well and leaders monitor accidents and incidents to ensure they can promptly address any emerging risks. Risk assessments for indoor and outside areas are undertaken regularly and daily checks are completed by staff to maintain the safety of the play environment. Leaders regularly review the risk assessments and confidently discussed them with us. Beneficial improvements have been made to the building including new outdoor fencing to ensure children are safe when outdoors. Leaders ensure the building is maintained to a good standard and servicing of utilities and equipment on the premises is undertaken in a timely manner, with certificates retained for inspection.

Leaders ensure that the environment offers good facilities to meet the needs of the children. There are a suitable number of children's toilets and nappy changing facilities for the children that attend. The indoor area is spacious, light and well organised. Resources are organised appropriately with interesting play zones that promote children's curiosity, imagination, and development. A lot of improvements have been made for the older children and there is a plan in place to do the same for the younger ones, making it more age appropriate. The outdoor area has been developed and improvements to safety aspects and resources have been made. Children clearly enjoy their play in a safe and stimulating area. The indoor environment is well managed so that children eat their meals in a calm, sociable space and there are rest areas should children tire.

Leaders ensure the quality of the furniture, resources, and toys are appropriate, of a good standard and are well maintained. They provide stimulating resources for all children attending. Most resources are kept at the children's level and accessible to them. Children's personal and social development is also encouraged well through access to multicultural toys and books and Welsh resources with some incidental Welsh used with children.



Leadership & Management

Good

Leaders are motivated, enthusiastic and operate the service to a good standard. They have a clear vision for the setting. There are suitable policies and procedures, many of which have been recently reviewed. At the time of the visit sleeping procedures were not in place, this has now been completed and the information shared with staff. They maintain good oversight of the service and ensure daily record keeping is effective. They have addressed previous Priority Action Notices, Areas for improvements and recommendations in a timely manner.

Self-evaluation is regularly undertaken and feedback from parents, staff and children is sought. Record keeping such as accidents and incidents are regularly reviewed to ensure that any issues are identified and addressed as soon as possible.

Leaders manage staff effectively and follow recruitment procedures to ensure the staff they employ are suitable and able to work in line with current childcare practices. They ensure there are enough qualified staff to care for children and the adult to child ratios are maintained or exceeded. Staff are suitably trained and qualified and hold a current Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) certificate. Group B safeguarding training has been completed by all staff with the management team also completing Group C.

Leaders build strong partnerships and work openly and transparently with outside agencies. They have a complaints policy and procedure in place and complaints have been dealt with appropriately. Partnerships with parents, carers, outside agencies, and other stakeholders are good and benefit children's development.

Areas identified for improvement

Where we identify **Areas for Improvement** but we have not found outcomes for people to be at immediate or significant risk, we discuss these with the provider. We expect the provider to take action and we will follow this up at the next inspection.

Where we find outcomes for people **require significant improvement** and/or there is risk to people's well-being we identify areas for **Priority Action**. In these circumstances we issue a Priority Action Notice(s) to the Provider, and they must take immediate steps to make improvements. We will inspect again within six months to check improvements have been made and outcomes for people have improved.

CIW has no areas for improvement identified following this inspection.
